

Legislative Update

January 14, 2020

The House left unfinished the work of reforming Ohio's gun laws, school funding system or reigning in an out-of-control private school voucher program. The Senate did not finish its priority drug sentencing legislation (SB3) before the year ended. Both chambers will be back in action at the end of January, beginning a short burst of activity that will pause for much of March so members can campaign in the March 17 primary. After they return, expect three months more of lawmaking before the statehouse empties out until after the November election.

Gov. Mike DeWine on Wednesday signaled he would be OK with ending the state's practice of using letter grades to rate school districts as the legislature continues its review of Ohio's K-12 accountability system. The governor said clarity is one of his major concerns as lawmakers consider proposals to overhaul the Ohio School Report Cards.

Debate Over Dropout Prevention Language Continues: State Board of Education members on Monday continued to debate how to recognize the efforts of a workgroup on dropout prevention policy without fully endorsing its recommendations. While BOE members widely agreed on the need to improve the state's guidelines for such schools, several questioned the wisdom of unequivocally backing the recent report of the Dropout Prevention and Recovery Workgroup. While a vote by the full board is scheduled Tuesday on a resolution supporting the document, BOE President Laura Kohler last week signaled the measure likely would be in line for an amendment. Under her proposed change, the board would agree to accept the report and its recommendations rather than support them

Speaker Larry Householder this week joined other state leaders in acknowledging an expedited fix may be in order as more and more districts are poised to lose funding due to an expansion of school voucher eligibility. Senate President Larry Obhof (R-Medina) earlier this month signaled his chamber would move to address the issue, which has come to light as many more districts – including those considered wealthier and higher-performing – stand to see students become eligible for the private school funding carve-outs.

Federal Notes:

EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS On December 20, President Trump signed into law the Further Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2020, providing funding for the Department of Education for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2020. The bill increases the agency's discretionary funding to \$72.8 billion, up \$1.3 billion from FY 2019. Among the programs receiving big increases: Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) Title I grants to school districts (up \$450 million, to \$16.3 billion); Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) Part B grants to states (up \$400 million, to \$12.8 billion); ESEA Title II-A Supporting Effective Instruction grants (up \$76 million, to \$2.1 billion); ESEA Title III English Language Acquisition grants (up \$50 million, to \$787 million); ESEA Title IV-A Student Support and Academic Enrichment grants (up \$40 million, to \$1.2 billion); ESEA Title IV-B 21st Century Community Learning Centers grants (up \$28 million, to \$1.2 billion); and federal TRIO programs (up \$30 million, to \$1.1 billion). The bill also boosts the maximum federal Pell Grant award per student by \$150 to \$6,345 for the 2020-21 academic year, as well as increases funding for Federal Supplemental Educational



Opportunity grants (up \$25 million, to \$865 million) and Federal Work-Study grants (up \$50 million, to \$1.2 billion). Further, the bill increases funding for key education-related programs at the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), including Head Start (up \$550 million, to \$10.6 billion), the Child Care and Development Block Grant (up \$550 million, to \$5.8 billion), and Preschool Development Grants (up \$25 million, to \$275 million).

Separately, the President signed into law two other education bills. The Fostering Undergraduate Talent by Unlocking Resources for Education (FUTURE) Act makes permanent \$255 million in annual funding for Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and other Minority Serving Institutions (MSI), enables disclosure of tax return information for the administration of federal student aid programs, and increases Pell Grant funding (President's statement, Secretary DeVos's statement and Twitter thread, and U.S. Senator Lamar Alexander's video). The Building Blocks of STEM Act modifies several National Science Foundation (NSF) programs that provide grants to institutions of higher education and nonprofit organizations to support science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) education research focused on early childhood.
